



# In Their Own Words: Interview with a Young Parent

- **1. Why did you start coming to Rose of Durham?** I knew that I was going to need help. I looked at my options and community resources and went from there.
- 2. How old were you when you found out you were expecting? I was 21.
- **3. How did you feel?** I was excited but worried about miscarriage due to my medical history. Other than that I was jumping for joy.
- **4. What supports did you have in place?** My mom and grandparents were my biggest support, along with some of my extended family. I was involved with the Healthy Babies Healthy Children program. I attended drop in at the YMCA and my LEAP (Learning Earning and Parenting through Ontario works) worker was awesome. I also went to the Pregnancy Help Centre, and of course Rose of Durham. As soon as I found out I was pregnant I called multiple agencies.
- **5. How has your life changed?** I have gained patience. I play with my child and try not be as serious or uptight. Since I had Keagan, I have gone back to school and I am more goal focussed now. I am looking at the bigger picture for the future.
- **6. What challenges have you faced?** The father of my child has been my biggest challenge so far due to lack of involvement and support.
- **7. How do you think society views you as a parent?** Everyone says I am doing a wonderful job with Keagan. He is polite, well mannered and has come so far considering he was a premature baby. A lot of people look down on teen parents but I believe that people should be judged by how they conduct themselves.
- **8.** What programs at Rose of Durham did you attend and why? I attended prenatal classes. Nobody's Perfect (a parenting program) to gain more information on premature babies. Mommy and Me (a social peer support group) to provide Keagan the opportunity to socialize. I also attend annual events such as Women's Health Day, Epic Parenting, and the Christmas Party each year. I also attend the summer program excursions.
- **9. How did these programs help in your role as a parent?** They increased my knowledge and the socialization skills will be useful within certain transitions for Keagan such as school.
- **10. How did your involvement with the Rose of Durham help you as an individual?** I have been supported with everything. The Rose of Durham is my go to agency. I like the fact that I am contacted regularly to check in and asked if I would like to attend programs. The staff seem to really care and are very friendly.
- **11. In your view, what is your greatest success?** My Son. He is my pride and joy. I never thought what I do would have such an impact on both our lives.
- **12. Did Rose of Durham contribute to your success?** Yes! The smallest things go a long way in moving someone forward in life. Help with toys and equipment and even a new snowsuit.
- **13.** What are your future goals and how can Rose of Durham support you? My future goal is to finish my nursing diploma (currently enrolled at Durham College) and continue to seek and access the help and support available to me.
