The Power of Partnerships

In 2012, Rose of Durham was asked to be the charity of choice for the Institute of Power Engineers' annual golf tournament.



What does this mean?

It means we provide assistance by supplying staff to help the day of the tournament and we promote the option to golf to our supporters and the general public. In exchange we are provided with the opportunity to host events the day of, such as the sale of passports for entry into contests, and 50/50 tickets.

In 2013, the Institute of Power Engineers began a custom of matching the money raised.

In 2016, Ralf Klopf, Ontario Director presented us with a cheque for \$2,000. Add to this the generous donation from the 50/50 winner who donated his winnings of \$230 back to the Rose, and the Rose of Durham received a total of \$4,125 for 2016.

From their lips to your heart, the real lives of young parents: Interview with a young father

How old were you when you became a father for the first time?

That's when life really started for me, I was 20.

How did you feel when you found out you were going to become a father?

Overwhelmed, wishy washy around the decision to keep, but very happy with the choice we made.

What are some of the challenges you have faced?

Lots ... greatest challenges have been when I was trying to make a relationship work that wasn't meant to work, and as a parent, always wanted to be a perfect parent and knowing there is no such thing, it weighs on me.

How has your life changed?

Feels like life for me began when my son arrived, if it wasn't for my son who knows where I would be right now, probably not a very good place. I do believe having children for some people makes them successful, gives them a reason. Before my son it was all about school and doing this and that.

How do you think society views you as a parent?

Society really doesn't understand

that dads want to parent too.

Courageous for a woman to be both parents, but when a man wants to do both it's not as accepted. When on a bus alone with my son I get a lot of looks, some feel like pity, some feel like judgement, I don't want either.

What do you want for your child's future?

Whatever he wants, I want him to find his own passion, his own path, and to be there only to help him achieve his goals.

Why did you start coming to Rose of Durham?

Prenatal classes and the dads group, when we decided to keep the child we researched what was available to us in the community.

How did these programs help you in your role as a parent?

Prenatal classes helped with bonding, felt like I was on the ball for the delivery, he was delivered at home.

Dads group has been a one of a kind experience for me as my son grows and there are different obstacles and challenges I take the information from the group to help me. Also the opportunity to share with other dads is invaluable.

How did your involvement with Rose of Durham help you as an individual?

Rose of Durham has helped define who I am, I am a parent first. I feel that without the help of the group and my individual counsellor I would not have been able to navigate the court and custody process, he (counsellor) helped me separate my personal feelings from the process and helped me see it from the perspective of what was best for my son.

In your view what is your greatest success?

My Son! I've won awards and trophies but nothing compares to the pride I feel for my son.

Do you feel that the Rose of Durham has contributed in any way to your success?

Of course, has helped to shape the type of father I am, without that foundation and support, I would not have been as successful.

What are your future goals and how can the Rose of Durham support you?

I would like to pay it forward, see more services for fathers in Durham.

Where do you see yourself in ten year?

Probably losing my hair, cause my son will be 13! I would like to advance myself in the trades, and for my son to see me as a success!
