

My Life My Voice: The Experience of Young Parents in Durham Region—Part 1

The Young Parent Community Coalition (YPCC) was established in 2005 with the purpose of ensuring young parents in Durham Region receive information and services that support and encourage them to be the best parents possible. While there is quantitative data regarding young parents in both Ontario and Durham Region, the YPCC found very little qualitative information about their lived experience. Existing qualitative research does not include the voices of young parents themselves. With this in the mind, the YPCC embarked on this research project to give young parents in Durham Region an opportunity to be heard, and share their experiences.

Pregnancy and parenting during the period of adolescent development can create unique social and economic challenges. Young parents are a vulnerable population and are often

significantly impacted by the social determinants of health. Research has shown that young parents and their children are more likely to live in poverty. Children living in low-income families and/or neighbourhoods have poorer health outcomes on average than other children on a number of key indicators. This includes infant mortality, low birth weight, asthma, obesity, injuries, mental health problems and lack of readiness to learn.

Despite these challenges, when young parents and their children receive the right support at the right time there are many short and long term benefits. A baby can provide a tangible reason to complete school and be better prepared for the future.

The journey through pregnancy and parenthood often inspires young parents to consider their future, including educational and employment goals. For many young mothers and fathers, it seems to provide the incentive to change direction or build on existing resources. Many have a renewed interest in education, training or employment. In some circumstances, teenage parenting may become more of an opportunity than a catastrophe.

This report allows the voice of participants to be heard, through the sharing of their pregnancy, birth and parenting experiences. It touches upon mental health, parenting, community supports and services and, most importantly, their collective hopes and dreams.
