

Adverse Childhood Experiences

The Adverse childhood experiences (ACE) study (Felitti, Anda, Nordenberg, Williamson, Spitz, Koss, & Marks, 1998) is a longitudinal study analyzing the impact of adverse early life experiences on the lifespan. The study focussed on three main categories of adversity:

- Abuse—including emotional, sexual, and physical abuse
- Family Dysfunction—
 including having an
 incarcerated relative,
 witnessing mother/step
 mother being treated
 violently, mental illness in the
 family, divorce, and substance
 abuse.
- Neglect—both physical and emotional neglect.

Participants in the ACE study were given a score between 1 and 10, reflecting the number of types of adverse experiences they were exposed to in childhood (Felitti, Anda, Nordenberg, Williamson, Spitz, Koss, & Marks, 1998). In short,

the study found that the more adversities a child faces, the more likely they are to develop mental and physical illnesses in adulthood.


The average ACE score for young moms is 4.6.

Children exposed to environments of abuse and neglect before birth and in the first years of life warrant the greatest concern for early brain development. In the absence of supportive and consistent caregiving (our service focus), these children are likely to suffer the

inescapable pressures of neglect, toxic stress, and trauma.

When designing and implementing programs and services at Rose of Durham the ACE study has greatly impacted the work that we do. In respect to building and teaching resiliency in our young parents to buffer the toxic stress that their children may experience.

We offer educational attachment programs that expose our parents to the importance of healthy attachment in the children's lives.
